Q: Where did you study and what degree did you earn?

A: I have a Ph.D. in Communication and Media Studies from the Institute of Communications Research at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign.

Q: What's the topic of your latest research?

A: My research in general is about women's labor in Hollywood, so my last research project was thinking about women who direct films.

A: It was really hard, but the students were very invested in it and the campus community really want it to happen, so


campus was really supportive.

After lunch, we stopped at a Chinese supermarket. In the market, we found a lot of Chinese snacks. I found a lot of snacks I had when I was a kid. These snacks contain my childhood memories. While we are shopping at the Chinese supermarket, American students learned more about Chinese food culture.

For example, dumplings are a traditional Chinese food and it means reunion; therefore, people usually make dumplings with their family during the Spring Festival.

We also found a milk tea shop next to the market. In China, Milk tea is a drink especially popular among young people. Like the traditional milk tea, it is made of mike, tea. But Chinese milk tea is also within a bubble which is made of gelatinous rice.

risk of HIV/AIDS among young women of color.

There was also another student at the discussion who said she only learned about pregnancy from television, instead of learning it from school. This goes to show how little sex education is taught in faith-based schools in the United States.

Q: What kind of job can those students who take the CMS class apply in the future?



A: I think the future of this


filed is about understanding the impact of CMS on this, to understand impact the on our life in a real way, the impact they have for people who develop them. for people who operate them and who run them. Not
